

# Jack's gone Over to the Gloryland. In E flat! (From Roland Bannister)

It is with sadness that I read of the death of Jack McLaughlin in the June Newsletter.

Back in 2018 it was my pleasure to introduce Jack as a guest speaker at our Newcastle U3A Music Appreciation class where Jack gave us a fascinating insight into his long life as a trad jazz musician. The rest of this story is a trimmed-up version of my introduction to Jack on that day.

Jack and I have known each other since about 1958. We met at the Friday evening Jazz Club in the G.U.O.OF Hall in Laman St, where he was the clarinettist in a New Orleans style jazz band led by trumpeter Ray Scribner, and I was a callow youth just discovering jazz. In those days Newcastle had a very vigorous jazz scene, and we promoted traditional New Orleans jazz with a degree of zealotry that is rare in other music styles.

From the beginning I was mesmerised by this music and soon took up the trombone. Jack - and members of Ray Scribner's band was an inspiration as I strove to become a New Orleans style trombonist. Jack and Ray and the others were few years older than me and so seemed to be of another generation. Over the years this age difference has eroded.

I left Newcastle in 1966 and so did not see much of Jack until I returned in 2003.

Over the years Jack has retained his interest in and deep commitment to New Orleans music. Right from those early days Jack's name has been synonymous with New Orleans music in Newcastle. Few people who do not live in Louisiana know the music as well as Jack McLaughlin of Newcastle, Australia.

I lacked aptitude for improvised jazz and found greater personal satisfaction in playing music written by others: brass bands, concert bands, orchestras, and jazz big bands. But New Orleans jazz is part of my DNA and I often listen to my treasury of NO Jazz recordings.

Jack attended Newcastle Boys High, trained as a teacher, was appointed librarian at Newcastle Girls High in 1965, and stayed there until he retired.

Some decades ago, Jack began to specialise in the Eb clarinet, with few excursions into the standard Bb instrument. Jack's talk at U3A was on *The Role of the Eb Albert System Clarinet in Early 20th Century New Orleans Funeral Parade Music*.

# **Postscript**

At the time of Jack's U3A talk he and I discussed his music experience. In my wisdom (I'm a music academic) I expressed the view that Jack always sounded as though he was improvising intuitively, or 'by ear' rather than from a deep knowledge of the chords ... the harmonic structure of the songs. Wrong! Jack told me that he had memorised the chord sequences to his large repertoire. He used to rehearse these silently - in his head - when on playground duty and bore them in mind on the band stand. I also asked him had he ever been interested in music other than New Orleans jazz. He told me that he'd tried other musics, but they

did not appeal to him. He'd been to New Orleans 27 times and was planning his 28th. He said - with a grin - that on the long flight from Australia he often found himself hoping that somebody had died so that he could play in a New Orleans funeral parade.

Jack did though confess to enjoying Little Richard singing religious songs. Jack, as many Jazz Club members know, recorded several CDs of traditional hymn tunes. He also made CDs of popular songs, all in the manner of the New Orleans old timers. Some of this music is available on YouTube.

# **CUMMINGS ROOM**

An interesting variety of music will be presented in the Cummings Room beginning with The Steve Jewell Trio. A band new to the festival is *Exploding Happiness*, an 11-piece band consisting of Drums, Bass, Piano, two guitars, two trombones, two saxophones, trumpet, and vocalist. Exploding Happiness is celebrating 30 years of music and



happiness, still with most of its original members, and their take on more left of centre jazz and contemporary music. This 11-piece has been up and down the coast and played at the Dubbo Jazz Festival in the way back as well as many sets at Lazybones, The Gasoline Pony, Camelot Lounge, Petersham Bowling Club, Marrickville Bowling Club and Venue 505. Always fun Always toe tapping. Great for dancing.

Also new to the festival is the *Civic String Quartet* who will play the music of Duke Ellington. The popular *Half Nelson* will also perform with vocals from Sheriden Nelson.

You can see the **Zach Horne Quartet**. - Zach, guitar, Mat Woodcock, trumpet, James Burgess, bass and Liam Tooth, drums playing arrangements of Australian folk songs, straight ahead jazz, and some original tunes. **Miau** is a Sydney based trio consisting of Penny McBride, trumpet, Nick Ketley, bass and Bon King, drums.- original mainly instrumental music with strong connections to the Australian landscape and spirit. **Chloe Gill Trio** – Emerging vocalist and composer Chloe Gill, Guitar/Vocal, performs some of the songs she has written. 


