34th Newcastle Jazz Festival - FRIDAY 25 AUGUST - Sunday 27 August 2023

The 34th Newcastle Jazz Festival was an outstanding success. The audience numbers were up on previous years, and we welcomed patrons from throughout Australia and even New Zealand. A special guest at the festival was Adrian Mears, former Newcastle resident and now Professor of Trombone at the Basel Music Academy in Switzerland. Adrian joined Dan Barnett and Jeremy Borthwick in the Unity Band to make a trombone trio and they played a wonderful version of Trombone Boogie. To conclude a set from Peter Locke, Andrew Dickeson, and Brendan Clarke they were joined by Adrian and George Washingmachine who sang 'Wrap Your Troubles in Dreams'. Adrian also joined Nicki Parrott for two numbers.

A number of young performers took part in the festival. These included from the Gold Coast, James Eller, saxophone, and clarinet and from Newcastle Aidan Ferrier, trumpet who sat in for a number or two with a few bands and Tessie Overmyer, saxophone, a former student at HSPA who played in the Nicki Parrott quartet and the all-female band Mousai. Brynn Hulls joined the Terence Koo Trio to sing a few songs including 'Someone to Watch Over Me and sang to a capacity audience. Terence and his Trio played a jazz tribute to the Matildas. Chloe Gill and her quartet provided some original tunes from Chloe and well-known songs including *Paper Moon* and *Nature Boy*.

Paul Hendon (Clarinet) from Toowoomba was also at the festival and when he and James Eller joined the Licorice Allsorts there was a five-piece Clarinet front line that played a rousing version of the George Lewis classic, St Phillip Street Breakdown. During the Jazz Gospel Lee Gunness paid an emotional tribute to Jack McLaughlin when she sang 'Just a Closer Walk with Thee.'

Jack McLaughlin Remembered at the 34th (From Roland Bannister)

The memory of Jack McLaughlin was a lovely local thread at the 34th Newcastle Jazz Festival. No wonder: until his recent death Jack had been a fixture on the Newcastle scene for more than 60 years. In his introduction to the Jack McLaughlin Memorial Band on Saturday morning, program officer Doug Saxon told us that this would be the first of the Newcastle Jazz Festivals that Jack would miss.

The Memorial Band included people who'd known Jack for almost as long as I had: there was Hendo, Paul Furniss, and Peter Boys. Paul played his metal clarinet, as Jack might have done. To enhance the occasion Jack's two daughters - Pip and Kim, his granddaughters Mia and Ellie and son-in-law Peter showed up for a touching moment. Ben McIvor, Jack's other son-in-law played in the memorial band.

Being old has some advantages. For example, few of us still have pimples after 60. But best of all, older people have knowledge that is simply unavailable to younger ones unless we oldies choose to share it.

For example, I knew Jamie Burns, the person who wrote the words for *Follow the Pathway to the Lord*, a song that is usually credited to Jack, and which has become part of the repertoire. I was around at the time and know that Jamie wrote the text and Jack composed the melody. This fact became pertinent at the festival as the tune was performed by the Jack McLaughlin Memorial Band. A song that tugged at the heart strings.

But I'd have to be one of the few who recall that Jamie (known in his later life as Jim) penned those words. Jim Burns was a great storyteller, poet, community theatrical performer, raconteur, larrikin. Jim came to Newcastle from

Scotland as a teenager c.1960 and at the time of his death in 2015 his Scottish brogue was still broad.

On the Sunday morning our wonderful Lee Gunness sang with Geoff Power's band. The first song was We Shall Walk Through the Streets of the City. Jack would have been in his element: he championed hymns and gospel songs in the New Orleans tradition. Lee paid tribute to the role that Jack had played in her life, and then sang Just a Closer Walk with Thee. Then she and the band did sacred favourites including Thomas A Dorsey's classic Take my Hand Precious Lord. Which gives me a chance to tell another little-known fact from the past.

Back in 1993 the Wagga Wagga *Daily Advertiser* - a paper I grew to love (and hate) during my 32 years in the town ran a headline 'Tommy Dorsey Dies', or words to that effect. The story told how gospel and jazz musician Thomas A Dorsey had gone to the Glory Land. Sorry *Advertiser*, Thomas A Dorsey was not known as Tommy. Tommy was the great white swing trombonist, who'd died back in '53 at age 51. Thomas A Dorsey was a black man, a pianist, and composer of some 3000 songs, it is said, and he lived into his early 90s. If you want to impress the grandkids with your knowledge of jazz, tell them about how Thomas A Dorsey and Tommy Dorsey were different people.

Jack entered *Follow the Pathway to The Lord* in the Original Tunes Competition at the 18th Australian Jazz Convention in Melbourne in 1963. The winner was John Robert's tune called *Jop*: I don't know what happened to *Jop*, but Jack's tune has become a bit of a classic among Australian New Orleans musicians, especially those who live in Newcastle. Festival Survey: Thank you to the people who returned the festival survey. One issue raised was that relating to catering including the coffee machine. At the City Hall we must use their catering system. All catering facilities are subject to a 'minimum spend'. This meant for example on the Saturday of the Festival if we didn't sell \$1463 worth of coffee, \$2682 worth of drinks, and \$3088 worth of food then the Newcastle and Hunter Jazz Club had to make up the difference. The longer we have the facilities open the greater the liability. At the time of preparing this newsletter we had not had a meeting with the City Hall staff to review this year's festival. When the meeting occurs, the matters raised by patrons in the survey will be discussed.
